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The graduation ceremony

Traditionally, universities and other tertiary institutions hold graduation ceremonies to formally confer awards on students who have successfully completed a program of study.

At Batchelor Institute, graduation ceremonies combine European traditions with the cultures of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities, graphically demonstrating the Both-ways philosophy of Batchelor Institute.

Among the most obvious elements derived from the European tradition of academic graduation is the distinctive academic dress worn by graduating students and others entitled to do so because of their position within the Institute or their academic qualifications.

The gowns, hoods and stoles worn by many of those at the ceremony have their origins in patterns which have changed little since the Middle Ages. Traditionally, the design, colour and decoration of each have come to indicate the status of its wearer by denoting the academic level achieved. The guide to academic dress that is located in the back of this booklet will provide you with more details.

Integral to the ceremony are elements that reflect the traditions of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities from which students come. In particular, graduating students are encouraged to combine traditional decorations and regalia of their culture with their academic dress, emphasizing the Both-ways significance of the occasion.

Dance also forms a part of the overall ceremony, including its opening and closing moments when the academic procession arrives and departs. In addition, individual students are often 'danced up' to receive their awards by family and community members.

Even when students are not accompanied by dancers, they are often escorted to receive their awards by family members, reflecting recognition of the shared and collective importance of each student's achievements.

PLEASE NOTE:

A large number of students whose names appear in this program will, by choice, receive their awards either in absentia, at the Batchelor Campus graduation ceremony in Batchelor, or at community celebrations held later in the year.

Keynote Speaker

Mr Charlie King OAM, AM

Indigenous Australian sports commentator. Award-winning anti-family violence campaigner

Decades spent working in community development, juvenile justice, child protection and family violence across the Northern Territory gives Charlie King OAM, AM a unique perspective on the strengths and challenges that face our community.

A Gurindji man whose mother was born in Limbunya Station and grew up in Khalin Compound, Charlie carries the legacy of the stolen generation.

Charlie has been a sports commentator on the ABC since 1990, hosting Grandstand and has commentated on various sports including Australian Rules Football and Cricket. As a broadcaster, Charlie was the first Indigenous Australian to commentate at an Olympic Games, in Beijing 2008. His broadcasting career included coverage of the London Olympic Games and the Commonwealth Games in Kuala Lumpur, Manchester and Melbourne. Charlie was the Chair of the Bonner Committee for 6 years, advising the ABC on Indigenous matters. Charlie was inducted into AFL Northern Territory Hall of Fame in 2019.

Charlie has been working in partnership with CatholicCare NT since 2006 developing men's programs and the No More Campaign, targeting sporting codes to address violence in their clubs and with their supporters.

His work has been recognized through a range of awards over the years including NAIDOC Person of the Year and Elder of the Year, Darwin City Council Citizen of the Year and more recently an Order of Australia Medal in 2015, the NT Senior Australian of the Year 2019 and was awarded the Member of the Order of Australia in 2021 for significant service to the Indigenous community of the NT.

Honorary Doctorate Recipient

Dr Kathleen Mills OAM

Kungarakan and Gurindji woman Dr Kathleen Mills OAM (Ngirawat Almiyuk Mooradoop), a decorated writer and musician and a prominent community leader, sadly passed away on 24 April 2022 at the age of 86.

Prior to her passing, she was awarded an honorary doctorate from Batchelor Institute during a ceremony on 16 March 2022, in recognition of her exceptional contributions to the wellbeing of First Nations peoples throughout her life. She was directly involved in the formation of many key First Nations organisations in the Northern Territory, including Batchelor College which would go on to become today's Batchelor Institute.

Her professional milestones included being the first woman elected to the Northern Land Council, being a co-commissioner for the Northern Territory panel of the Stolen Generations Inquiry, and becoming a Member of the Order of Australia for her services to the Indigenous community. She lobbied tirelessly for reparations for the Stolen Generations and championed the languages of First Nations peoples.

Her creative achievements included her years of participation in the NT Writers Festival, the publication of her poetry in anthologies and journals, and the much-loved 'Arafura Pearl' being recognised as an icon by the NT Heritage Society. A co-authored book about her father, Jungung Jack McGinness: Plaiting the grass for family, the community and the future 1902-1973, was released in 2019, while Mookanoonganuk, a collection of her poetry published by Batchelor Press, was launched in 2020.

She is remembered for her instrumental role not only in the history of Batchelor Institute, but also in First Nations education as a whole. She is greatly missed by many.



My skin group is Pandanus (miyartinga) and my Totem is Crocodile (yirrikipayi). I love drawing barramundi (alamunga) because it makes me think about going out fishing at the old fish trap near the barge landing.



Guide to academic dress

The predominant black red and gold colours of academic dress mirror the colours of the Aboriginal flag, and the logo in these colours that adorns stoles and gowns is a design that represents four people sitting around a campfire telling stories to each other.

VET GRADUAND DRESS

A plain gold gown and a stole covered in ochre satin with one white logo.

HIGHER EDUCATION UNDERGRADUATE DRESS

A plain gold gown and a black hood lined in red satin.

POST GRADUATE DRESS

Doctoral graduands can be distinguished by their red gown, gold satin yoke and red tudor bonnet. Masters graduands have a gold hood lined with maroon, and a black trencher with black, red and yellow tassels.

MILITARY MEDALS

Medals, both military or civilian, may be worn by both students and staff, however, must be worn on the garment/uniform under the Academic Regalia. Medals are not to be affixed to the Academic Regalia.


